







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What is 21st century teaching and learning?


- The term "21st-century skills" is generally used to refer to certain:
- core competencies such as collaboration
- digital literacy
- critical thinking
- problem-solving that advocates believe schools need to teach to help students thrive in today's world.

Definitions of 21st Century Skills

- CRITICAL THINKING SKILLS refers to students being able to analyze complex problems, investigate questions for which there are no clear-cut answers, evaluate different points of view or sources of information, and draw appropriate conclusions based on evidence and reasoning.
- COLLABORATION SKILLS refers to students being able to work together to solve problems or answer questions, to work effectively and respectfully in teams to accomplish a common goal and to assume shared responsibility for completing a task.
- COMMUNICATION SKILLS refers to students being able to organize their thoughts, data, and findings; and share these effectively through a variety of media, as well as orally and in writing.
- CREATIVITY AND INNOVATION SKILLS refers to students being able to generate and refine solutions to complex problems or tasks based on synthesis, analysis, and then combining or presenting what they have learned in new and original ways.
- SELF-DIRECTION SKILLS refers to students being able to take responsibility for their learning by identifying topics to pursue and processes for their own learning, and being able to review their own work and respond to feedback.
- GLOBAL CONNECTIONS refers to students being able to understand global, geopolitical issues including awareness of geography, culture, language, history, and literature from other countries.
- LOCAL CONNECTIONS refers to students being able to apply what they have learned to local contexts and community issues.
- USING TECHNOLOGY AS A TOOL FOR LEARNING refers to students being able to manage their learning and produce products using appropriate information and communication technologies.

Modern classroom

 In a modern classroom, students are actively involved in constructing content and new ideas. They use active learning approaches, such as project-based learning and designbased learning, where students are engaged in real, relevant, and purposeful activities.



- Teachers lead the teaching profession.
- Teachers advocate for schools and students
- Teachers demonstrate high ethical standards.

- Teachers embrace diversity in the school community and in the world.
- Teachers treat students as individuals.
- Teachers adapt their teaching for the benefit of students with special needs.
- Teachers work collaboratively with the families and significant adults in the lives of their students.
- Encourage an environment that is inviting, respectful, supportive, inclusive, and flexible.

- Teachers know the ways in which learning takes place, and they know the appropriate levels of intellectual, physical, social, and emotional development of their students.
- Teachers plan instruction appropriate for their students.
- Teachers use a variety of instructional methods.
- Teachers integrate and utilize technology in their instruction.
- Teachers help students develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills.
- Teachers help students work in teams and develop leadership qualities.
- Teachers communicate effectively.
- Teachers use a variety of methods to assess what each student has learned.

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- Teachers analyze student learning.
- Teachers link professional growth to their professional goals.
- Teachers function effectively in a complex, dynamic environment.

What does 21st century Professional Development look like?


 21st century skills professional development prepares teachers and principals to integrate 21st century skills into their classrooms and schools. Professional development for the 21st century should be a part of a comprehensive emphasis on 21st century skills that includes updates to standards and assessments.

Successful 21st century professional development programs:

- Ensure educators understand the importance of 21st century skills and how to integrate them into daily instruction
- Enable collaboration among all participants
- Allow teachers and principals to construct their own learning communities
- Tap the expertise within a school or school district through coaching, mentoring and team teaching
- Support educators in their role of facilitators of learning
- Use 21st century tools

21st Century Professional Development

- Highlights ways teachers can seize opportunities for integrating 21st century
- skills, tools and teaching strategies into their classroom practice and help
- them identify what activities they can replace/de-emphasize
- Balances direct instruction with project-oriented teaching methods
- Illustrates how a deeper understanding of subject matter can actually enhance
- problem-solving, critical thinking, and other 21st century skills
- Enables 21st century professional learning communities for teachers that
- model the kinds of classroom learning that best promotes 21st century skills
- for students
- · Cultivates teachers' ability to identify students' particular learning styles,
- intelligences, strengths and weaknesses
- Helps teachers develop their abilities to use various strategies (such as
- formative assessments) to reach diverse students and create environments
- that support differentiated teaching and learning
- Supports the continuous evaluation of students' 21st century skills development.

The Adaptor The 21st Century teacher, as a visionary, must have rich imagination to: The Communicator see the potential in, grasp, and manipulate the emerging tools and The Learner web technologies; look at others' ideas and envisage how they would use these in their class; looks across the disciplines and through the curricula and make links that reinforce and value learning in other areas; and make other fields as leverage to reinforce their own teaching and the learning of their students
